Registration:

The \$10.00 registration fee includes refreshments and materials and <u>must be paid by the</u> <u>conference deadline of February 6, 2012.</u> (Schools that are paying for the event by Purchase Order must have issued the PO by the registration deadline and will pay the amount of the PO.) Invoices will be issued the day of the event. A mid-morning snack (**NOT LUNCH**) is provided. Registration is limited to the first 300 PAID registrants. Limited scholarships are available. Directions:

(www.twu.edu/maps.asp) From Lewisville, take I-35 North. Turn east on Hwy 380 (toward McKinney on University Drive) and right on Bell Avenue. The MCL Building, on the left, is at the corner of Bell Avenue and College Street. Park in lots near the building. Plan to arrive at TWU by 8:15 AM. If you are arriving with a school group, your information packet will be distributed by your teacher, otherwise, pick up your information packet in the foyer on the first floor of the MCL building. Once you've received your packet, students should gather in the auditorium. In case of inclement weather on the conference date, check the TWU website (www.twu.edu) to see if the campus is closed. The conference will be cancelled and there will be no refunds.

Looking at the Future - Career Exploration Workshops

(A) Wildlife Detective - Texas Game Wardens are responsible for law enforcement off the pavement. Unlike TV shows, Game Wardens do much of their own crime scene investigation, and more often than not, their witnesses can't talk. (C) Puzzles of the Past - What was going on 100 years ago, 1000 years ago, or 1,000,000 years ago? Learn how archaeologists put together clues from the past to teach us more about our history., Dr. Lisa Nagaoka, Assistant Professor of Archaeology, UNT (Updated for 2012)

(D) The Beauty of Cosmetic Science - Prepare a cosmetic lotion. Learn about product development and careers in cosmetics., Michelle Alessandro, Mary Kay Cosmetics

(E) Getting Cheeky With DNA - DNA is the basic stuff of life. You will extract your own DNA and get to take it home in a necklace., Dr. Laura Hanson, Department of Biology, TWU

(F) Heart Smart - What does the heart really do? Learn how the heart works and why it is so important to the rest of the body. You will get to listen to your own heart beat, learn how to take your pulse and blood pressure, and get a chance to see how we record what the heart does on paper. *Vicki Zeigler, Phd. RN.*

(G) Picture Perfect Skin - What must it be like to have really bad acne or skin cancer or to treat one of the many conditions that affect hair, skin or nails. Become a patient, a doctor, or just come to learn about having picture perfect skin. Interactive dermatology workshop. *Lisa Ostrowski, Physicians Assistant*

(H) Who are you? - Students will don lab coats, gloves and safety glasses and become a DEA Forensic Chemist for an hour, identifying an unknown substance using field tests and instrumentation utilized by DEA chemists on a daily basis., *Denis Gara and Angela Smith, Forensic Chemists, Drug Enforcement Agency*

(I) The Science of Smiles - An interactive exploration of how science, math and technology are used by dental hygienists in everyday practice to help people maintain pretty smiles., Dr. Chris Beatty, Dental Hygiene, TWU

(J) Food for Thought - Biochemistry in the kitchen. Discover the principles of biochemistry with items found in a common kitchen. See how by tasting, testing and more., Carolyn Sacco, Outreach Committee of the Post-doctoral Association at UT Southwestern.

(K) Slime, Sludge & Silly Putty - Science is all about precision. Discover the importance of precision and how different weights and measurements impact your experimental results., Brittany Mason, Outreach Committee of the Post-doctoral Association at UT Southwestern.
