The North Texas Interbranch Council of AAUW met January 15, 2011, at the Dallas Public Library.

Dr. Suzanne Enck-Wanzer, Communications Professor at the University of North Texas, was the speaker. Dr. Enck-Wanzer is involved in the **Resolana project**, which works with imprisoned women to prepare them for life after prison. Collaborating with a number of groups, Resolana helps these women develop job skills, learn how to apply for work, and "break the cycle of incarceration."

Currently, 900 women are incarcerated in the Dallas County Jail at a cost of \$56 a day per person, for a daily cost of \$50,000. Resolana provides programming for 75 of these women. Classes are offered five days a week and focus on life skills, physical well-being, creativity and resources.
