R is for Research

This article is the first in a series about REAP, an acronym representing the value of AAUW member-ship.

AAUW is nationally recognized for its scholarly research on issues affecting women and girls.

In 2010, AAUW published Why So Few?, an analysis of eight research findings pointing to environmental and social barriers that continue to inhibit women's participation in STEM fields. Other research titles over the last decade include: Behind the Pay Gap (2007),

showing that one year out of college, women are already behind in pay; Where the Girls Are (2008), examining girls' educational achievement in the past 35 vears: and Mom's Retirement Security (2006), revealing that 40% of adults know very little or nothing about their mother's financial situation.

The latest research study, to be released in November, is titled Crossing the Line, examining sexual harassment in the nation's schools, grades 7-12. Having access to cutting-



edge research on gender issues is certainly an important benefit of **AAUW** membership.

AAUW Celebrates Women's Hall of Fame Inductees

Eleven outstanding women were inducted into the National Women's Hall of Fame in Seneca, New York, October 8, 2011. Four of those women have played a role in AAUW's mission.

Helen Murray Free, a national member of AAUW, was honored for her contributions to medicine. With a degree in chemistry, Free's research revolutionized diagnostic testing and



Inductee Donna Shalala was Secretary of Health and Human Services under President Clinton. Shalala was an AAUW young scholar award recipient. "It was critical money and a critical award and a critical trajectory," Shalala remembered. "I loved the fact that they inter-



vened in my career, and it made a real difference. AAUW helped me network. I met amazing people as a result."

Lily Ledbetter,

another inductee, has been a friend of AAUW and a key figure in the fair pay campaign, from the Supreme Court case to the legislation named in her honor. She continues to work toward passage of the Paycheck Fairness Act.

Fellow inductee Barbara Mikulski, a Senator from Maryland, believes that AAUW plays an important role in shaping young women's lives. "Young people need someone to believe in them," she said. "Some people have family that will believe in them. Not everyone has that supportive adult that tells you, 'You can do it, and I can help you.' It makes a difference to do that in young people's lives.
