Dr. Agatha Beins, Assistant Professor of Women's Studies at TWU, will address our Branch's March meeting.

In 2011, Dr. Beins
earned her Ph.D. in
Women's and
Gender Studies from
Rutgers University. She
also holds an M.A. in
Women's Studies from the
University of Arizona, and



an M.F.A. in Creative
Writing and
Poetry from

Eastern
Washington
University.

Dr. Beins' topic
wil be "Riding the
Waves: An
Aesthetic
Interpretation of
US Feminism

Since 1970."

Dr. Beins writes: "An image of Wonder Woman proclaiming with my speculum I am strong! I can

fight!' from the cover of a Los Angeles feminist newspaper published in 1973 appears 25 years later on the cover of a riot grrrl zine (an informal, handmade, photocopied magazine) in England. While it is not unique or uncommon for graphics to circulate across space and time, particularly within doit-yourself cultures, the recurrence of this particular image invites a rethinking of the history of contemporary feminism. In recent scholarship there has been

considerable attention to the relational dynamics of 'second wave' feminism (1970s-1980s) and 'third wave' feminism (from the late 1980s-1990s), much of which works to deconstruct the wave metaphor and examine the often antagonistic depiction of this relationship. Contributing to this conversation, my talk offers a reinterpretation of the second/third wave debate, Specifically, I use a close reading of the aesthetics of

grassroots publications to disrupt the narrative that characterizes the third wave as a negative reaction to the politics of the second wave."

#### **Interbranch Council hears TFN's Garrett Mize**

Garrett Mize, Texas
Freedom Network's
Youth Advocacy coordinator, spoke to
AAUW North Texas
Interbranch Council
on February 2 at the
Highland Park Cafeteria. The event was
hosted by the Mesquite Branch and was
well-attended by area
AAUW members.

Mr. Mize focused his remarks on the newly -elected State Board

of Education. According to Mr. Mize. although a number of new members have ioined the SBOE. it remains to be seen how the balance of power between moderates and religiousright members will be affected. The divisive, and often embarrassing, conflicts over the Science and Social Studies curricula that put Texas in the national spotlight may be repeated as

the SBOE now moves to adopt textbooks for those subjects.

Mr. Mize concluded by showing a short clip from *The Revisionaries*, TFN's documentary about the SBOE's culture wars. The film will be shown in its entirety March 5, 6-7:30, in Room 111C, Chilton Hall, on the UNT campus. The showing is free and sponsored by UNT Libraries.
